## Top Tips

# 1 Think outside the kitchen!

## Be careful


Do not touch cleaning products as they can be dangerous. Ask a parent to help you with the bottles.



## 2 Look out for labels

When you go shopping to the supermarket with your parents, you should check wrappers to see if packaging can be recycled.

Most food packets will have little pictures on the back, like the ones below. These pictures tell you if the wrapper can be recycled or not.



# 3. Bag up old clothes

In your cupboard, keep a bag for clothes that are too small or you will not wear anymore.

Once you have filled the bag, you can take the clean clothes to a charity shop or to a textiles bank with your parent.



# 4. Rinse!

Remember to rinse your recycling before putting it in the bin. If you don't it could start rotting and attract bugs and flies.

Also if it is not rinsed, it will make the whole pile dirty and it will be recycled.

#### Make some paper!

- 1. Get some paper scraps and soak them for about 30 minutes in hot soapy water (a bit of washing up liquid is fine).
- 2. You can even add some food colouring to make fun coloured paper.
- 3. Pour the mixture into a shallow container, then press a piece of plastic on top of the mixture and squeeze all of the water out.
- 4. Remove the plastic.
- 5. Lay another tea towel on top and roll it out with a rolling pin so it is very thin.
- 6. Let it dry for a day. You may want to ask a parent to iron it to dry faster.

Once it is dry, the paper is ready to use!
