2) What were the sessions about?

The sessions raised various points. We discussed repairs and works on our estates; our caretaking service and how we communicate with residents. It has helped address the issues our residents wanted to speak about with us.

3) What did you take away from these sessions?

For me, it was the ability to make that personal connection with our residents that I appreciated. There

are thousands of residents who live in the borough and as the Cabinet Member for Housing, I do not get to meet them all. These sessions exemplify why I got into politics; to defend people's right to housing.

4) What will you do with the feedback received from tenants and leaseholders?

We are currently compiling the feedback and we will use it to shape the council service as we move forward. We will also be reporting back to our residents on the changes we take up.

Over 100 residents attended between June and August 2020.

II meetings were held which included Leaseholders, Young Tenants and residents in Temporary Accomodation.

Top three priorities given by residents attending were

- 1. Repairs which was a clear top priority. 2. Staying safe and
- 3. Improving the look and feel of the estate.

Just under half of residents who took part were from Black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) communities. The attendance was representative of the local communities in the borough.

Residents wanted a mix of digital and face to face meetings.

There will be a final summary circulated to participants to see the overall results.

Say hello to a new generation of council homes!

We are delighted to announce that the pilot scheme in our 750 home Greenwich Builds programme – designed to tackle the effects of London's housing crisis – has been successfully completed. The scheme of four homes is located in Woolwich at Lister Terrace on Robert Street, with tenants moving in since July.

Greenwich Builds aims to combat a housing crisis which has led to homes becoming unaffordable for many people, including the key workers we all rely on to keep essential services running. These first homes have helped to establish Greenwich Builds' environmental credentials through the use of technologies like air source heat pumps and solar panels, helping to tackle the climate emergency.

Despite the complications of COVID-19, Lister Terrace was completed quickly and with minimal disruption to neighbours, thanks in large part to the use of innovative modular construction which meant that the properties could be built offsite before being safely craned into place and installed. This also allowed work to be finished safely and in line with government guidelines on social distancing in the workplace.

One of the new tenants described her new home as "a great improvement, our old place was too big for just me and my daughter and I am very impressed by the look of my new house, as I've never lived in a new-build before. My hopes are to take it a day at a time, get the house decorated room by room... I love it!"





Another new resident, Laura, pictured below with husband Saulius on their moving-in day, said "I'm so happy and excited, compared with my old place it's so much better, finally we have our home!"

Greenwich Builds progress so far

- Delivered: four new homes at Lister Terrace
- Under construction: 26 homes across six sites
- Planning applications currently submitted: 197 homes across four sites, with a nursery & retail unit with more to come.

Stay safe this Autumn

We understand that *autumn* is the season of falling leaves, Halloween, Guy Fawkes Night, bonfires and fireworks.

Residents can only hold bonfires or fireworks in their own private garden, not on any other part of the council housing estate or communal area.

If you want to use fireworks in your own private garden, follow these tips from London Fire Brigade:

Residents should also follow social distancing measures, in place from 14 September, that restrict people from meeting with other households socially in groups of more than six.

Unlicensed music events

We're being extra vigilant after a growing number of unlicensed music events, block parties and illegal gatherings across London and the wider UK. These types of events are normally held without the necessary

- legal permissions and safety precautions and pose a significant risk to those who attend.
- These events also place an additional burden on the police, the Council and other public sector organisations that help keep Royal Greenwich and its residents safe.
- Although there has been some relaxation of lockdown restrictions, social distancing still applies, because if there is a concerning rise in the infection rate, then the government may have to re-impose some restrictions;
- by acting responsibly and within the law, we can help avoid this. You can report a suspected unlicensed music event to the police by calling **IOI**. In an emergency always call 999. Information can also be passed anonymously to Crimestoppers by calling 0800 555 111.



Rent advice during the pandemic

We understand that the COVID-19 crisis has created financial difficulty for many people. If you are on the government's furlough scheme which will stop at the end of October, and think this may make paying your rent difficult, please contact us now.

We want to do all that we can to support you, so if you are unable to pay your rent, please contact us immediately to discuss your situation and we will work with you to address any issues.

You can email **rent-account-enquiries@ royalgreenwich.gov.uk** to explain your situation and we will get back to you. You can also speak to your Income Officer, whose telephone number is on your rent statement and arrears letters.

If you are currently experiencing financial difficulties, we can renegotiate payment plans and help you claim *financial* support and benefits that you may be entitled to.

If your income has been reduced, you may be entitled to Universal Credit and/or other benefits. This may include help with your rent payments. If you think you are entitled to any support, take action straight away.

The courts are reopening for serious arrears, antisocial behaviour and other cases. If you have high arrears and have not discussed this with your Income Officer – contact us now for advice and to make a repayment plan otherwise you could risk eviction.

Benefits advice and hardship support

If you need advice on your benefits entitlement, support to manage your claim or to complete an application, contact our Welfare Rights and Universal Support team on **0208 921 3333** (Monday -Friday, 10am - 4pm) or visit
